HAUNTING, RUMBUSTIOUS, FESTIVE, ROMANTIC, THEATRICAL ... WOW!

Building on our hugely successful programme last season, the forthcoming 2018-19 one looks really exciting. We've included some wonderful music including well-known favourites such as **Tchaikovsky's Romeo and Juliet** and **Gershwin's American in Paris** but also music by composers we rarely seem to play like **Wagner** and **Mussorgsky**.

Added to that, we also have some big name soloists, including the acclaimed British pianist **Martin Roscoe** in the **Gershwin Piano Concerto** and the amazing young horn virtuoso **Katy Woolley**, until recently Principal Horn of the Philharmonia (and who coached our brass section for Mahler 8), performing the **Horn Concerto No. 1 by Richard Strauss**.

We mark the centenary of the end of World War 1 in November with a special **Armistice Concert** featuring **Elgar's** choral work **The Spirit of England** and, a first for the Phil, the haunting **Pastoral Symphony of Vaughan Williams**, inspired by his own experiences serving in the trenches. We welcome back **Catherine May** to sing the ethereal wordless soprano solo.

December sees a rumbustious **American Night** with the aforementioned Gershwin pieces plus an opportunity to mark **Leonard Bernstein's** centenary with a performance of his sparkling **Overture Candide**. **Copland's Billy the Kid Suite**, which we had such fun playing in a repertoire night a while back, and the rarely heard **Essay No 1 by Samuel Barber** complete the programme.

The Orchestra and choir come together this year for the festive **Family Christmas Concert**, and in February the Orchestra perform a gorgeous programme of romantic German and Russian music including **Wagner's Overture and Venusberg Music from Tannhauser** and **Rimsky Korsakov's Capriccio Espagnol**. Finally to end the season in rousing style, our friends from the Choir of the Musik-Institut Koblenz join us to perform that most theatrical of choral works, **Verdi's Requiem**. I think you will agree it's definitely a season to relish!

Choir News

We have been described in the Press this season as a 'great body of skilful singers', alas not skilful singers with great bodies, but you can't win 'em all!! The Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness was 'closed' with the *Cloud Messenger*, Holst's rarely performed work. According to the programme notes, Holst was 'greatly depressed' by the lukewarm reception the piece received at its premiere in 1913, but the 2017 rendition had a better review where 'the singers entered readily and with confidence into the changing moods of this attractive setting of an ancient Indian poem.' And although the message didn't actually come until page 51, we enjoyed the build up!

Clouds ticked off the list it was then the rush into Christmas: performing at Jarrolds and St Andrews Hall where we enjoyed the juxtaposition of Santa getting stuck in the chimney and Ave Maria Stella by Edvard Grieg. As ever the Christmas concert is increasingly popular and tickets sold out some weeks before David had even finalised what we were going to sing! We then finished off the 2017-18 season 'in resounding fashion' (according to EDP critic, Christopher Smith) with Brahms' brief but haunting Song of Destiny, followed by Mendelssohn's more rousing Hymn of *Praise*. Many of us miss the Festival chorus which gave the opportunity to carry on singing into the summer, so we are delighted to have been invited to join with Cambridge Phil to re-visit Mahler's Symphony of a Thousand. Most singers hope to sing it once in their choral careers, but about eighty choir members will be singing it for a second time in two years, and while we appreciated the performance space at the Norfolk Show Ground, perhaps Ely cathedral will offer a more spiritual and awe-inspiring setting for this epic work. Rehearsals have already begun and the performance is on Saturday 7 July. Tickets from https://www.elycathedral.org.



As Sally usually writes this piece, she rarely gets a mention beyond the appreciation shown in choir rehearsals, so on behalf of the chorus, thank you Sally, for your unwavering good humour whilst getting us all organised throughout the season and beyond. Thanks also go to Tim Patient –was ever a man appropriately named and of course David Dunnett who alternately has us laughing at his wonderful witticisms and then evoking childhood memories of being told off when we don't get it right! I think Christopher Smith summed him up beautifully when he mentioned his 'impressive strength' and 'tasteful delicacy'!

Next season promises to be a memorable one with the November concert celebrating the **centenary of the 1918 armistice** and the incomparable **Verdi** *Requiem* in March. First rehearsal is on Tuesday 4 September. See you there!
